Ohio Academic Content Standards for Science - Grade 10		
Activity	Standard	Description
2	Life 6	Explain that a unit of hereditary information is called a gene, and genes may occur in different forms called alleles (e.g., gene for pea plant height has two alleles, tall and short).
1, 2, 3	Life 7	Describe that spontaneous changes in DNA are mutations, which are a source of genetic variation. When mutations occur in sex cells, they may be passed on to future generations; mutations that occur in body cells may affect the functioning of that cell or the organism in which that cell is found.
3	Life 13	Explain that the variation of organisms within a species increases the likelihood that at least some members of a species will survive under gradually changing environmental conditions.
2, 3	Life 20	Recognize that a change in gene frequency (genetic composition) in a population over time is a foundation of biological evolution.
3	Life 21	Explain that natural selection provides the following mechanism for evolution; undirected variation in inherited characteristics exist within every species. These characteristics may give individuals an advantage or disadvantage compared to others in surviving and reproducing. The advantaged offspring are more likely to survive and reproduce. Therefore, the proportion of individuals that have advantageous characteristics will increase. When an environment changes, the survival value of some inherited characteristics may change.
2, 3	Life 26	Use historical examples to explain how new ideas are limited by the context in which they are conceived. These ideas are often rejected by the scientific establishment; sometimes spring from unexpected findings; and usually grow slowly through contributions from many different investigators (e.g., biological evolution, germ theory, biotechnology and discovering germs).
2	Life 27	Describe advances in life sciences that have important long-lasting effects on science and society (e.g., biological evolution, germ theory, biotechnology and discovering germs).
2, 4, 5	Life 28	Analyze and investigate emerging scientific issues (e.g., genetically modified food, stem cell research, genetic research and cloning).
2, 4	Sci & Tech 1	Cite examples of ways that scientific inquiry is driven by the desire to understand the natural world and how technology is driven by the need to meet human needs and solve human problems.
2, 5	Sci & Tech 2	Describe examples of scientific advances and emerging technologies and how they may impact society.
4	Inquiry 1	Research and apply appropriate safety precautions when designing and conducting scientific investigations (e.g. OSHA, MSDS, eyewash, goggles and ventilation).
2, 3, 4	Inquiry 2	Present scientific findings using clear language, accurate data, appropriate graphs, tables, maps and available technology.
3	Inquiry 3	Use mathematical models to predict and analyze natural phenomena.
